Procedure	
 The patient is seated with the foot and ankle relaxed off the edge of the examination table. With the knee extended, the examiner passively dorsiflexes the foot and ankle. If pain and deep tenderness in the calf is felt, it indicates a positive Homan's sign for deep vein thrombosis. 	
Results and interpretation	
Positive: Pain and deep tenderness in the calf	
Negative: No pain and deep tenderness in the calf
