Infant Language Development Activities Handout

Birth to 3 months

• Talk to your baby:

Regularly talk to your baby about your day, emotions, or actions. The sound of your voice helps them begin to understand communication.

Sing songs:

Sing simple nursery rhymes and lullabies to introduce your baby to the musicality of language.

· Imitate sounds:

Make cooing and babbling noises and pause to give your baby a chance to respond, fostering early conversational skills.

Expected milestones:

- · Reacts to familiar voices.
- Coos and makes pleasure sounds.
- · Begins to babble.

4 to 6 months

· Read aloud:

Use picture books with large, colorful images to capture your baby's attention while you describe the pictures in simple phrases.

• Expand responses:

When your baby makes sounds, respond as if they are conversing with you. This teaches turn-taking in communication.

Use gestures:

Incorporate gestures like waving goodbye, pointing, and nodding while you speak to help associate actions with words.

Expected milestones:

- · Babbles with expression.
- · Laughs and squeals.
- Makes sounds to show joy and displeasure.

7 to 9 months

· Name objects:

Consistently name common objects during daily routines to build your baby's vocabulary. For example, say "bottle" when you give them their bottle.

· Play interactive games:

Engage in games like peek-a-boo and pat-a-cake to encourage social interaction and verbal responses.

• Encourage imitation:

Mimic your baby's sounds and encourage them to imitate your words, which will help develop their speech skills.

Expected milestones:

- Understands "no."
- · Makes a lot of different sounds like "mamama" and "bababa."
- · Copies sounds and gestures of others.

10 to 12 months

• Encourage simple words:

Prompt your baby to use simple words like "mama," "dada," "more," or "done." Celebrate any attempts they make to speak.

Ask questions:

Ask simple questions and pause to give them a chance to respond, which helps them learn the structure of the conversation.

• Introduce more complex songs and stories:

To stimulate language comprehension, include songs with gestures, like "The Itsy Bitsy Spider," and read more complex stories.

Expected milestones:

- Says simple words like "mama" and "dada."
- Shakes head for "no."
- · Tries to imitate words.
