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Scoring

To calculate an overall score for authoritative parenting style, average the responses to the following 15 items: 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, 12, 14, 18, 21, 22, 25, 27, 29, and 31.

For the authoritarian parenting style, mean the scores of these 12 items: 2, 4, 6, 10, 13, 16, 19, 23, 26, 28, 30, and 32.

To determine the overall score for permissive parenting style, average the 5 items: 8, 15, 17, 20, and 24.

This scoring protocol yields three continuous variables—mean scores for each parenting style—rather than categorical variables.

Interpretation

- Authoritative parenting: This style strikes a balance between warmth and structure, emphasizing support, affection, regulation, and fostering autonomy.
- Authoritarian parenting: Characterized by high demands and low responsiveness, this approach often involves elements such as physical coercion and verbal hostility.
- **Permissive parenting:** Defined by indulgence and leniency, permissive parenting focuses on granting freedoms and exhibits a lack of firm boundaries.
